A Jewel to be Treasured

uring the week of May 6-11, 2018 we celebrated "Catholic Education Week" in all our schools and churches across Ontario. The theme for this week was "Renewing the Promise." Some might ask "what promise?" The promise is one that was made to parents many years ago that a Catholic education would be provided for their children if they worked together and cooperated in building this important educational system. In union with bishops and clergy, and the Ontario government, school boards were established so that parents could send their children to a Catholic school, where the environment and teaching would assist the child to grow both in faith and in knowledge, and especially in moral character as taught to us by Jesus and found in the gospels.

Parents requested this education for their children and many parents, my own included, sacrificed money and time to make sure the Catholic system continued to grow. In renewing the promise, we reflect on two previous documents by the bishops of Ontario on education called "This Moment of Promise" from Renewing 1989 and "Fulfilling the Promise" from 1993. Catholic education has always been a priority for the bishops of Ontario. Over the years and to this day they continue to work with boards, trustees, teachers and support staff to help Catholic education become stronger. It is an

integral part of the educational system of Ontario and has been so for over 160 years. Almost 600,000 students are educated in our Catholic schools in the province of Ontario.

I believe that Catholic Education is a "Jewel to be Treasured". I had heard this phrase used once before in describing our Catholic system and at times I think we might take it for granted, since it has been around for so long. It can be a danger for us to take things for granted. It is important that we remind our Provincial Members of Parliament about our desire for Catholic Education and seek their continued support for our system. It cannot be taken for granted, for we are aware that there are some who would want it abolished altogether. Our system is based on our Catholic faith, and everyone involved, whether they are administration, teaching staff or support personnel along with parents and clergy, must do their part for the good of our system and for the good of the many thousands of students in it. It is not a perfect system, but our work together always makes it better and stronger.

Catholic Education week combines the themes of reconciliation, solidarity, love, justice and ecology. We are reminded of these themes often in the writings and talks of Pope Francis. In renewing the promise today, we are pledging our continued support for Catholic education in our province, and even though we might not have children in our system any longer, we recognize the importance of parents having the choice to send their children to a Catholic school where knowledge and faith are taught and witnessed.

We need the support of our priests who visit our schools and share in special liturgies and Masses for our students and emphasize faith for them; we need the support of parents who see the school as an important place not only for education but also as a place where their children will socialize and interact with others in a community of caring and sharing; we need the support

of grandparents and the Catholic community to lend a hand in helping our system of Catholic education to grow and flourish. We all have a part to play, and each part is

essential, especially when our system is challenged by others.

May and June are months when many students are preparing for graduations and sharing some discernment about their future vocation. To see the many graduates of our Catholic

secondary schools going out into the world, to use their gifts and talents to build a better world for all, is the proof of the importance of "Renewing the Promise" today. As a Catholic community, many of us who are graduates of our Catholic education system, let us always resolve, whether we are laity or clergy, that we will always work together and in harmony and in solidarity for the good of Catholic Education in our diocese and in our province. It is a part of who we are as a Catholic community and it brings great gifts to our Church community and to our local community with benefits for all. It is a jewel which we must treasure, and only in working together will it be maintained and strengthened for our future generations of children.

We celebrate Catholic Education and we give thanks to God and those who sacrificed and worked in the past to create and pass down this jewel to us and our community. How fortunate we are to have such a gift. Let us make sure we safeguard it and treasure it for all.

Corpus Christi Parish Evolving St. Vincent de Paul Services: Our Story and Our Need

orpus Christi St. Vincent de Paul has operated in the parish for over 25 years and its primary function is as a food provider to those in need. The format for that service has changed over the years as demand and supply also changed. In the beginning it was merely a few bags of groceries provided to walk-ins at the office. Then it became more organized and a group of delivery volunteers took over, until that became rather untenable as the volunteers aged and found it more and more difficult to make the deliveries.

Finding the need to be more accountable we went to an open pantry operating from our Narthex where we would register those coming in and hampers would be provided from our stock in the basement pantry.

The early days would see 25-30 families served each week, and by 2017 that number rose to over 100 weekly, putting pressure on our storage capacity as well as our aging cadre of volunteers.

After looking at numerous scenarios it became apparent that we could not continue in this manner and a decision was made to close the pantry and find another way to serve the community.

That way was to approach a number of schools in the north ward to see if we could assist with their breakfast/lunch programs, and the answer was a resounding YES.

To facilitate this change we arranged with a local wholesaler to provide a fixed amount to each school every month based on the number of students involved. From September 2017 to June 2018 we expect to provide approximately \$15,000 in healthy food choices.

Providing students with adequate meals means they don't fall asleep midmorning, thereby making possible an education that may very well relate to the need to have fewer food banks.

This year will be a year to change the executive. At this point, after over a year of notices, no one has come forward to continue this most important ministry. To fill the vacated executive spots we would need a chair/president, a qualified treasurer and a meeting secretary. The demand on the executive and council has changed dramatically in the past year as it has gone from a very physical food bank regime — 50,000 lbs of food a year — to a more administrative role.

I feel we cannot let all the efforts of those that have worked so hard to maintain an integral part of our parish just wither away, and this is our last opportunity to share the word about this most serious and valuable work. Please see the plight of this very worthwhile ministry and what we would lose should it close when a few hours per month would mean a huge difference to so many people. If we are able to continue, there are also other opportunities to assist our youth that could be considered.

A decision on the future of SSVP needs to be made by June15, 2018 to prepare for the new school year. Please look carefully at the need and contact me if you have any questions.

We can't let our future – our students – down for the sake of a few hours that would see this Christian cause continue to thrive.

n May 6th, celebrating an early Mother's Day Mass in Italian with Fr. Dan Lapolla, c.s. at St. Dominic Church, the Ladies Venet Society celebrated a long and grand history of their organization, giving thanks to God, and honouring both the living and deceased members and the great work that they have done over many years in the name of charity. These women have worked many years supporting charities.

From its beginnings in the East End of Fort William in 1940 to its charitable works today, the Ladies Venet Society has continued to contribute to the cultural fibre of our community. Formed for the express purpose of uniting women who trace their cultural roots to the Northern regions of Italy, the members have continued to meet to exchange common ideas and to carry out fundraising events that are beneficial to local charities.

For many years the Society has celebrated events that are a reflection of major festivals of their homeland. In November, the Castagna Chestnut Harvest was celebrated to remind members of the festas in their villages when roasted chestnuts were peeled and dipped into the "novello" — the first wine. Before the Lenten season began the members held a "Carnevale" Tea at the DaVinci Centre. Guests were treated to afternoon tea with an Italian flavour, where the atmosphere and costumed servers were reminiscent of the famous parades and balls of Venice. This became the major fundraiser for the ladies, who worked tirelessly to ensure that the guests had an enjoyable afternoon and that a local charity benefitted from their support.

Many city organizations benefitted from the fundraising efforts of the Venet Ladies. For many years the George Jeffrey Children's Treatment Centre was a major recipient.

Other beneficiaries of major donations included the Cancer Society, Northern Cancer Research, and the Alzheimer's Society. The Venet Society contributed over \$60,000 to the Thunder Bay Regional Health Science Centre. St. Joseph's Foundation received over \$15,000. A pledge was also made to the Foundation for St. Joseph's Hospice Palliative Care Campaign.

TEC Educating and Evangelizing Through Good Friday "Tableau" Stations of the Cross: On Good Friday evening, Corpus Christi parishioners were invited to pray the Stations of the Cross, with the "pictures" of each station made up of youth and young adults. For at least fifteen years, live Stations of the Cross have been held at Corpus Christi on Good Friday, originally organized through the TEC (Teens Encounter Christ) program, under the leadership of TEC Director, Debbie DeBruyne. For many years after, the Youth Ministry team at Corpus Christi organized them, and for the past two years, they returned to being organized by Debbie, through TEC. Debbie explained, "It is a teaching moment and a way for TEC to evangelize parishioners and parish youth." The youth involved always comment on how this experience helped them to better understand the Stations of the Cross and what Jesus and the others there experienced. Those who come to watch and pray feel that seeing real people in the tableau "pictures" brings them to a deeper place of prayer and love for our Saviour. The New Evangelization in action!

A charism of TEC is Evangelization through a multi-generation approach. That was beautifully portrayed between the rehearsal and praying of the Stations, as all involved gathered for a light meatless supper, and the older generation shared some knowledge about the roots of the Stations of the Cross and of fasting.





he Most Rev. Fred J. Colli recognized *Thunder Bay Street Gospel* participants at a Celebration of Appreciation held at St. Agnes Parish on May 6, 2018. His inspiring message expressed thanks and appreciation to all involved in *Street Gospel*. Lisa Laco, *Superior Morning* Show Host for CBC Thunder Bay, focused on faith outreach through social media as an opportunity for growth of the Catholic Church. Founder of *Thunder Bay Street Gospel*, Fr. Jerin Louis, shared the 121st *Street Gospel video* as the project embarks into its 3rd year of production.

What is Street Gospel? *Thunder Bay Street Gospel* is an initiative put forward by Catholic young people to spread the Word of God using video media. Each week a 3-4 minute video is produced featuring practising Catholics in our Diocese sharing personal reflections on selected Scripture readings for that Sunday. A volunteer production team coordinates lighting, audio, staging, filming and editing. The video is streamed through YouTube where it's accessed through social media sites. Viewers have an opportunity to respond, offering insights on how the video affected them. The episode is then archived in the YouTube channel. The Need for *Street Gospel*: Accelerated cultural changes in our society have led many Catholics to become disengaged from the church or to abandon their faith altogether. As these disengaged Catholics raise their own families, their children often undervalue their faith as a source of enrichment to their lives.

Young families and youth represent the foundation of growth for the Catholic Church. Yet, these are the people most difficult to reach by traditional methods because social media has changed the way families and youth acquire and share information.

"This video project, in keeping with Pope Francis' urging to use social media for spreading the Good News so others can know Christ Jesus through our efforts, responds to that challenge," said Bishop Colli.

Street Gospel brings hope for the future of our parishes by reaching hundreds of people each week on their own ground, through iPads, Smart Phones, or other devices. Strengthening and sustaining this connection is pivotal to our missionary role as the *modern* Catholic Church.

Street Gospel Benefits: For viewers, the Good News videos reach beyond practising Catholics to *all* Catholics. We create another space for people to know







Jesus again. Catholics become more acquainted with the faces and personalities of other members throughout our Diocese. Reflections presented by people of all ages reinforce unity and the inter-generational nature of our congregations. The bond between the Catholic Church and School is also strengthened as teachers blend the weekly video reflection with school-based faith messages. For Participants, *Street Gospel* encourages a personal retreat with God. Participants begin discipleship by taking time to sit with the Word, reflect on what it means to them, and grow in their understanding of Scripture. They take the next step as missionaries, reaching beyond their own circles into the lives of strangers, sharing their faith experiences in their own unique way.

Evidence Points to Success. Many Catholics in our Diocese are ready and willing to participate in sharing their faith through *Street Gospel*. They just need the right opportunity to do so! Consider that there are now more than 120 episodes with one or more speakers in each episode ... a heartwarming tribute to discipleship!

Program tracking confirms that *Street Gospel* touches the lives of 848 viewers each week, on average, plus various groups of viewers.

How did Street Gospel Begin? Street Gospel was initiated in 2016 by the Corpus Christi Youth Group led by Associate Pastor Jerin Louis. For the first 3 months, the project operated with borrowed cameras, loaned equipment, and volunteer trainees to produce a few *Street Gospel* videos. These were so well received the enthusiastic Youth Group committed to produce one video each weekend.

It soon became clear that *Street Gospel* could only be sustainable with its own production equipment. Corpus Christi, St. Agnes and St. Margaret parishes readily assisted with interim funding. The Diocese of Thunder Bay generously added the required support in 2016, 2017 and 2018, and now fully funds the project.

Thunder Bay Street Gospel is well positioned to advance its work well into the future. As a Diocesan project, it has the earned support of the Most Rev. Fred J. Colli, Bishop of Thunder Bay, priests, and parishioners throughout Northwestern Ontario. Fr. Jerin Louis continues to provide inspiration and leadership for the project.

Bishop's Diocesan Ministry Campaign: 2018

When Jesus walked on this earth, he entered a world of tension and confusion. There was political unrest, social upheaval, class distinctions, community divisions and much religious tension. To respond to these issues and to bring some hope to mankind, he began a ministry of compassion, love and peace, emphasizing the love of God for all.

As we examine the world around us, we can see many of those same tensions present today. How do we respond to these tensions and divisions? As disciples of the Lord, we are called to follow his example, and to be a people of compassion, love and peace in our interaction with others. That is the message of the Gospel that Jesus has given us. He told

us that whenever we do something generous for the poorest among us, we are doing it to the Lord himself. In this way we recognize the Lord Jesus in the people around us; we see the Lord Jesus in others.

Our diocesan campaign this year has this theme in mind, as we seek to respond to the tensions, concerns, and needs that surround us in our diocese. Each year, these needs increase, and each year, as a diocesan family, we seek to respond by helping others, by showing the compassion and concern demonstrated by Jesus, and by recognizing that the Lord is present in the people we are called to serve.

Once again, I ask you, the faithful people of our diocese, to respond generously to this campaign and to assist me and the priests, deacons and other ministers, who reach out with the caring hands and heart of the Lord. Our campaign does not change much from year to year, and that is because the needs and concerns are always present. In some cases they become even more challenging for us as time goes on.

Your generosity responds to the needs of families, in particular through our assistance to Catholic Family Development, the Dew Drop Inn, the Catholic Action Community, the Refugee program and through our Catholic Support Programs. Your donation responds to the needs of our young people through the Youth Ministry Office supporting programs for youth, the chaplaincy at our university, TEC and World Youth Day encouragement. Some of the campaign funds go to the ongoing education of our priests, for study days, retreat days and for the program that teaches and educates our Permanent Deacons and our Ministers of Service. We encourage vocations to the priesthood and to religious life, and we assist priests who are retired with their health care programs.

Our Adult Faith Office and the Office of Worship help the entire diocesan family with ongoing faith education and liturgical development. A good portion of the campaign assists struggling parishes with their financial needs. With dwindling populations and the lack of employment, many of our smaller, remote parishes struggle to sustain themselves and

their resident priest, and our campaign gives them hope and supports them in many ways.

As the bishop I am very grateful to everyone who donates to this campaign. I thank my priests for their support in encouraging you to participate. I know that everyone is called to assist charities throughout our area each year, and I appreciate it very much when you make my annual Ministries Campaign a priority for your donation.

Pope Francis continually reminds us that we need to be the hands and heart of Jesus in our lives. He demonstrates this most evidently in his compassionate

Education

Adult Faith Office (\$45,000). Provides support for liturgical ministers and the resource library at the Catholic Pastoral Centre that offers a wide variety of religious materials for workshops and conferences.

Office of Worship (\$20,000). Encourages liturgical understanding through programs designed to enhance the quality of religious celebrations.

Catholic Education Office and Native Ministries Office (\$10,000). Supports and encourages a close relationship between the Diocese and Catholic school boards throughout northwestern Ontario and communication links for native ministry projects and events.

Youth

University Chaplaincy (\$35,000). Provides a full-time chaplain (Sister Alice Greer, C. S. J., Ed. D) for all students at Lakehead University. Program includes counseling, support workshops, liturgies, and religious services.

Youth Ministry (\$20,000). Provides training for youth leaders, retreats, and resources for such programs as NET, Salt and Light, and parish youth programmes.

World Youth Day, 2019 (\$20,000).

Teens Encounter Christ (TEC) (\$5,000). Supports and assists the programs of the Sleeping Giant TEC retreat program within the Diocese of Thunder Bay.

Social Services

Family Support Services (\$70,000). The Catholic Family Development Centre offers a variety of programs to assist those in need of counselling and support.

Diocesan Marriage Tribunal (\$20,000). Provides help to those who need to reconcile their marriage with the Church through annulments.

Refugee Settlement (\$20,000). Through the operations of D.O.O.R.S. the Diocese assists needy immigrants with clothing, housing, and their relations with the Government of Canada.

Catholic Support Programs (\$45,000). Financial support is given to organizations such as the Dew Drop Inn, Catholic Action Centre, Birthright, and Mission to Seafarers, Serena, Cursillio, etc.

Diocesan Aid (\$40,000). Supports missions and smaller churches and their clergy operating in remote areas of the Diocese.

Clergy

Vocations (\$5,000). Promotes vocations to the priesthood within the Diocese of Thunder Bay.

Permanent Diaconate Program (\$15,000). Supports the training of those seeking to become permanent deacons and ministers of service within the Diocese.

Ongoing Education for Permanent Deacons (\$10,000). Provides formation programs that continue to educate our deacons in their ministry.

Ongoing Education of Priests (\$25,000). Provides workshops and training programs for priests in the Diocese.

Priests' Infirm Fund (\$25,000). Assists retired priests who are in special care facilities.

Priests' Pension Fund (\$20,000). Supplements the pension fund of our priests for their future retirement needs.
